When asked one thing that we admire about St. Jeanne, here is what some of our Little Sisters had to say:

## Mother Margaret

"Her complete trust in Divine Providence to provide for the needs of the elderly Residents is something I greatly admire. She would say, 'If God fills the house, he will not abandon it.' That says it all."

## Sr. Francis John

"Just one thing? It's hard to pick! I think it would be her ability to see Christ in the Residents, especially the first Resident, Anne Chauvin. St. Jeanne often said, 'The poor are our Lord,' and she treated them as such."

### Sr. Agnes

"I admire her courage and confidence in going out into the world and approaching powerful businessmen and leaders to make the needs of the elderly known. That was unusual for women at that time (the mid-1800's). She was ahead of her time."

#### Sr. Paul Colette

"Her simplicity and littleness."

#### Sr. Rose

"I admire her strength of character. She knew her place before God, which gave her courage to be



humble, but also strong."

#### Sr. Louise

"Her self-giving. She gave to others without thinking of herself. She gave her whole self to God."

During Jeanne Jugan's time, many of the elderly Residents she took in were found begging on the streets. As their "little sister," she said, "I will go out and beg in their place." She believed in involving others in her mission. She once told a businessman whom she was asking for a donation, "We will share the elderly, you will provide for them and I will care for their needs." As such, she allowed no endowment or guaranteed income for the order. She and the other Little Sisters would rely on God and their friends in the community to provide everything they needed.

Many years later, we Little Sisters still follow these guidelines. Just like Jeanne Jugan did, today two sisters go out daily and ask area businesses for donations of money and items we need for our Home. They return with bountiful supplies of fresh produce, bread, eggs, and meat, which all go to the kitchen to be worked into the

week's menu. Along with these necessities, there is also the occasional load of fresh flowers for the chapel, poinsettias to decorate for Christmas, party supplies—all things that make our Residents' quality of life better.

It's a beautiful sight to see the outpouring of generosity from so many of our friends who help support our elderly. It's been said that it takes a village to raise a child. We, like St. Jeanne Jugan, believe the same is true of caring for the elderly. Society as a whole is so much better when we honor and care for those who came before us.
